Kyle Dipre, our seminary intern, finished his time with us on Sunday, April 29th. That Sunday he blessed us with a closing sermon and we celebrated him with a special coffee hour. I hope you joined us that day. If not, please lift up a prayer of thanksgiving for Kyle's time with our church.

Kyle came to us around two years ago and started worshipping and responding to requests for volunteers. In September he and I began our intern-supervisor relationship as he worked on finishing his final year of seminary. This summer Kyle will begin taking classes towards a law degree at the University of Akron in his home state of Ohio.

It goes without saying that Kyle has been a great resource for our church. It seems every couple of weeks someone around church "could use a few guys" to come and help move something, or set something up, or break something down. Often Kyle volunteered to be one of those "guys" by coming early or staying late to different events. Kyle was a resource for us as a spiritual leader. He helped to lead us in worship. He preached twice and led a *Children in Worship* story during one of our breakfast worship gatherings. He led us in our congregational prayers. He helped me lead the communion liturgy. He led the Children's Sermon several times. He came with me on pastoral care visits. He led the Wednesday Bible study. Kyle blessed us with an inspiring two-part presentation on forgiveness and the Book of Jonah. Kyle was a resource in discernment. He came to team meetings, Blawenburg Village School board meetings, and consistory meetings; he went mostly to observe, but from time to time, he contributed his opinion and ideas. Kyle did all this and more....

Kyle was a resource to me as a conversation and prayer partner. We met weekly during his internship in the front lobby of Princeton Seminary's library. Sitting by the bay windows over cups of freshly brewed coffee, I found our meetings to be inspiring, helpful, and full of humor. He has a shrewd mind that is always ready to probe, question, and consider. Kyle was more than willing to think and talk through many aspects of our church life and my style of pastoral leadership. In the Bible, the Book of Proverbs says, "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another." Through our weekly meetings Kyle helped keep me sharp. He also prayed for me. We ended our meetings by sharing what we could use lifted up in prayer that week and saying prayers for one another.

Through it all, God was working. God was working to make Kyle a blessing to us and our church community and God was working to bless Kyle. I want to say thank you to everyone for being willing to share in the responsibility to receive Kyle. I want to thank you for the ways that you offered him opportunities to explore his gifts and his calling. Thank you for giving Kyle opportunities to learn about and grow in his faith and his relationship with God.

Relationships are at the core of God's mission and God has blessed us with the opportunity to develop relationships with Kyle. For that I am grateful. The consistory has prepared a modest thank you gift, which I will be giving to Kyle before he departs for his law classes in Ohio. If you haven't had a chance to say "thank you" to Kyle personally, reach out and find a way to let him know that you are praying for him as he begins the next chapter of his life's journey.

New Worship Time – 9 AM!

So far, so good! But last month's request bears repeating: In order to allow time for Pastor Jeff to enjoy fellowship with us briefly after church and still be able to get to Griggstown in a timely manner, the Worship Team asks for your cooperation. 

RCA GLOBAL MISSION DEAR FRIENDS UPDATE

from Lois Wanyoike in South Africa March 2018

Dear Friends.

There are very few people who have the level of energy, passion, faith and skill that Kaybe, Executive Director at SFCS, has! She is a wife, a mother of three, a daughter, a sister, a niece, an aunt to many and yet, she never lacks the time or energy to lead and manage our efforts of finding loving families for children in Botshabelo. She dreams of a day when no child in Botshabelo will be without a family. Kaybe shares her journey and dream for her community in the letter below. Be blessed, Lois.

For almost a decade, I managed different community development initiatives in the Free State province of South Africa. Each day, the pain of a community that I loved and was proud to be a part of, increasingly stared at my face while in the line of duty. Within those early years as a social worker, I had my first child - this made me see the children and families in Botshabelo in a different light. Almost 40% of my home town's 200,000 population are children aged under 18 years. More than ever before, I saw and felt the pain

of mothers and fathers unable to provide for their families as unemployment rates rose to a current rate of 70%. I noticed how grandparents, were aging and tired yet burdened with the responsibility of raising their grandchildren. Increasingly, there were daily reports of children abandoned, neglected or abused in my community. Teenage pregnancy and crime rates were on the increase. More and more children were separated from their parents because of HIV related deaths, crime or job opportunities in other parts of the country. As a government worker, I saw firsthand the social department's struggle in coping with the increasing needs of orphaned and vulnerable children. Institutional care increasingly became an option for these children as the community felt disempowered to care for them. Unfortunately, there are no brothers, sisters, moms and dads, aunties and uncles for children placed in institutional care. These children have no sense of belonging and much as they may have a roof over their head and a meal to share, they crave the undivided attention every child deserves to receive from a parent and a sense of belonging that a family provides. I knew my community needed help and that help would not be from a government that was already under resourced with social workers battling to manage heavy workload.

SFCS has become that answer to prayer for children, families and the community in Botshabelo. What a joy I get to be part of a team that's restoring hope in my beloved home town! SFCS' mission is to see every child in Botshabelo thrive in a family because children thrive best in families and not in institutions. To date, we have placed a total of 74 children with local adoptive families in South Africa. In 2017, 47 children were reunited with their families and over 300 at-risk families strengthened to prevent family separation. Our foster care program has become a model for other sections in Botshabelo in managing caseloads effectively. The local church continues to be one of our key and instrumental partners and more churches have stepped forward to become part of the solution. Majority of the local adoptive and foster care parents have been recruited through the local church events. We held a wonderful 3-day marriage conference in the last quarter of 2017 with over 100 pastors and their spouses. Our hope is to see the church equipped to support and strengthen families of their members so that children in Botshabelo have healthy thriving families to grow in. Partnerships with other community stakeholders have strengthened our efforts to create a responsive community that protects and cares for its children.

SHIP Lunch - Tuesday May, 29th


