Blawenburg Welcomes Pastor Jeff Knol, Jamie ... and Raleigh

"We have a pastor!", said Church's VP of Consistory Dave Cochran on Sunday, June 19th. Reverend Jeff Knol, from the Colts Neck Reformed Church, near Freehold, guest preached that day. Following the service, Dr. Cochran convened a meeting of the congregation and it voted a unanimous approval of the Search Committee's recommendation and the church's governing body's decision to extend a "call" to Reverend Knol. Within days, the Delaware-Raritan Classis of the RCA – the governing group to which BRC belongs – approved the action, and Rev. Knol accepted. Pastor Jeff signs on with Blawenburg Reformed Church officially on Tuesday, August 23rd.



"Jamie and I are really excited about this new chapter in our lives," Rev. Knol said, "and we're looking forward to meeting everyone at the church." August 27th, a Saturday, looks like move-in day at the parsonage. Ahead of that, the Knols plan to do some of their own painting in the pastor's residence.

...And a Baby, Too!

Jamie Knol is expecting, so we'll have a baby in residence as well. Anticipated due date: Mid November. The Knols are doing it the old fashioned way...they'll be pleasantly surprised with a girl or a boy.

Here's a little background on Jeff and Jamie...

Both Jeff and Jamie are from Michigan, originally. They met while attending Calvin College in Grand Rapids. Jeff attended Princeton Theological Seminary and earned his *Master of Divinity* degree there in 2012. He also took specific denominational courses at New Brunswick Theological Seminary. In September 2012, Jeff signed on as a part-time Youth Pastor at Emanuel Lutheran Church in New Brunswick, and the following June he became Interim Pastor at the Reformed Church of Highland Park. In the fall of 2013, Jeff became Associate Minister at Colts Neck Reformed Church where he has taught the confirmation class, led a high school youth program, and




Welcome Karen Larsen




Mary and Martha



Church World Service Care Kits

Once again we will be filling Care Kits for our Church World Service September mission. This year, however, we will fill school kits and hygiene kits rather than the baby kits. The CWS program partners and other agencies that had previously received the baby care kits decided to discontinue the use of baby care kits starting this year. Changes in program directions have helped to guide this change. They are thankful for our years of previous support which benefited many families around the world, but they are now asking us to put our energy and resources into making CWS Hygiene Kits and CWS School Kits. Both of these kits are in high demand with partners all around the world.

When you see summer sales and back-to-school sales (especially in ShopRite or Walmart), please think about the very important items needed for these kits. If you want to do a complete kit on your own, please do so. Or if you buy in bulk, please bring your purchases to church or put them on the brown table in the basement of Cook Hall. If you can't shop and want to make a monetary donation, someone else will shop for you. Please write a check to BRC and note on the memo line "CWS Kits". Cash donations are also accepted. You may use the pew envelopes or your Mission Fund envelopes in your offering packet labeling each with "CWS Kits".

CWS School Kit

One pair of blunt scissors removed from the package (rounded tip, only)

Three 70-count bound notebooks or notebooks totaling 200-210 pages

(No loose-leaf or filler paper.)

One 30-centimeter 12" ruler

One hand-held pencil sharpener removed from the package

One large eraser (no pencil cap erasers)

Six new, unsharpened pencils with erasers removed from the package

One box of 24 crayons (only 24)

One 12"x14" to 14"x17" finished size cotton or lightweight, solid colored canvas bag with cloth handles (no logos). No reusable shopping bags or backpacks.

If anyone has any of the cotton or lightweight, solid colored fabric described above, please consider donating it for the school kits. Last year Evelyn Cochran made beautiful, colorful bags; but this year CWS is asking for solid colored bags.

CWS Hygiene Kit

One hand towel measuring approximately 15"x28" to 16"x32" (no fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber) One washcloth One wide-tooth comb removed from the package One finger nail or toe nail clipper removed from the package One bath size bar of soap in the wrapper One toothbrush in the package Ten standard size Bank-aids

All items need to fit inside a one-gallon plastic zipper closure bag. Remove the excess air from the bag and seal. Do not add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date

Third Graders Learn About Blawenburg and BRC by Barb Reid

On three separate days in June, over 300 Montgomery third graders came to our church in groups of 50 to learn about what life was like in Blawenburg in the past 200 years. They learned about how the church broke away from Harlingen and became the centerpiece of Blawenburg. Dave Cochran presented this program and has been doing so for a number of years.

We continue to be amazed and amused by words that come out of the mouths of babes! Upon entering the west door of the sanctuary, one young lady stopped, did a full panoramic spin and exclaimed, "This is BEAUTIFUL!" Dave asked the children to vote on how long they thought it took to build the church over 180 years ago. They were given the following options: three days, three weeks, three months, or three years. Most voted for three years. They were astounded when they learned that construction took only three days. "WHAT? WHAT!" could be heard throughout the sanctuary. One young man summed it up best: "Wow! All this in three days!"



From the perspective of those of us who were privileged to observe, it was evident that Dave remarkably made an impression on each and every class in Montgomery who visited our church. All classes were given the unique opportunity to gain from his knowledge as well as witness his love for this church. He was gentle as well as engaging. The children were attentive and filled with energetic excitement after their time with him. They left with a better under standing of our historical church and we can only attribute such credit to Dave.

<u>Classis Corner</u>

As you may or may not know, our church is one of 30 organized churches and a few church starts or mission churches that make up the Delaware-Raritan Classis. Our Classis along with the Classis of New Brunswick [which our new Pastor Jeff Knol is coming from] and the Passaic Valley Classis and the Classis of Greater Palisades make up the Regional Synod of the Mid-Atlantics. Our Regional Synod along with six other synods across the USA and Canada make up our denomination: the Reformed Church in America, the oldest Protestant denomination in the country. Our Classis has been referred to as a 'fleet of ships', sailing together and supporting one another. We have long been aware that we, as a Classis, have limited resources and manpower to give many churches the help and support they need.

This Spring Classis contracted with Holy Cow Church Consulting to conduct an assessment of our Classis, its ministry, focus and passions, its effectiveness and potential. The survey was called <u>The Landscape</u>. Our Classis Executive Committee and our Congregational Care Committee met on June 14th to go over the results of the survey, which were very helpful. The main points for here and now are that there is lots of room for improvement and most of our church consistories know little if anything about what Classis does! So, as your Elder Delegate to Classis, I will endeavor to share some of that with you here over time.
