Acts of Kindness and Hospitality

Dear Friends,

Thank you for all your loving support during Mait's recovery. I have often fretted over how best to help someone in the same situation, and you have provided my answer. It is not the grand gesture that helps us most. It's the little things that help us cope. Let me list a few "acts of kindness" that have come our way and are so appreciated. These are suggestions that we can all use.

- 1. Be specific. "I would like to drive you to the hospital on Tuesday" *or* "I will visit with Mait on Wednesday in case you need to run errands."
- 2. Write notes, or leave phone messages that don't require answers.
- 3. Offer to return phone calls for me/us.
- 4. Bring small snacks that can be eaten later: trail mix, cookies, fruit.
- 5. Remember, the caregiver needs company--maybe more than the patient.
- 6. Pray for us. Even weeks later we still need your prayers.
- 7. Lend a listening ear as we share our worries. (This works really well over a game of Scrabble!)
- 8. Take the caregiver for a walk around the hospital or rehab center.
- 9. Run an errand for us.

Many, many more loving things have been done for Mait and me. I appreciate each and every one. I'm sure Wendy and Bob and Don could add ideas to the list.

We will kick off our Fall with packing up our <u>Church World Service kits</u> after church on <u>Sunday, September 23rd</u>. For the full list of what is needed for the Baby, School and Hygiene Kits and patterns follow the link to 'kits' at www.churchworldservice.org or pick up the cards at church. This is the best time to buy these items as well as to get treats and gifts for the Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes, whose deadline always surprises us (November)! <u>We particularly need</u> the following items to complete the kits we have started:

For 25 School Kits: (7 completed, thank you)

- 12 large erasers(Pink Pearl types)
- 15 blunt/rounded tip child scissors
- 10 book bags (12"x14" to 14"x17" finished size with handles)
- 9 12"/30cm rulers
- 13 handheld pencil sharpeners
- No more pencils, crayons or notebooks are needed.

For 7 Baby Kits:

- 3 infant t-shirts or undershirts (no onesies)
- 14 baby gowns or sleepers (see website for pattern if want)
- 14 diaper pins
- 3 <u>baby</u> washcloths
- 30 diapers
- No more sweaters or blankets now

For 25 Hygiene Kits:

- 20 hand towels (@16"x28")
- 17 washcloths
- 16 nail clippers
- 23 bar soaps (bath size in wrapper)
- 18 toothbrushes (individually packaged)
- 87 standard size bandaids
- 2 wide-toothed combs

Emergency Clean-up Buckets are also always desperately needed, but are too difficult for us to pack. You are invited to donate the \$56 for CWS to purchase the items themselves or the \$10 for the Hygiene kits, the \$15 for the School kits, or the \$39 for the Baby Care kits. They also request \$2 per kit for processing/shipping. Please place items or \$\$ for buying them in the baskets in Church or Cook Hall by Sept. 16th. Thank you.

We continue to donate non-perishable food items and toiletries to our neighbors at the Montgomery Food Pantry. The collection baskets are in Church and Cook Hall.

The following article appeared in the Courier News and the Home News Tribune in early August. In case you don't read those newspapers, we are reprinting it here.

Blawenburg Reformed Church and Crawford House, a Win-Win Partnership By David Cochran

Most churches give generously to missions, and Blawenburg Reformed Church in the historic village of Blawenburg in Montgomery Township is no different. Members give regularly to support missionaries and other Reformed Church of America missions. They even rally to help people devastated by hurricanes and other natural disasters. But the 180-year-old church wanted to do something more. Led by the late Bill Herbert, the church sought ways to reach out to the community with hands-on help in 2009.

They didn't have to look very far, for just two miles away is a halfway house that has been helping women recovering from drug and alcohol abuse since 1978. Herbert made the initial contact with Crawford House Executive Director Linda M.

Leyhane to explore what their needs were and seek ways the church could provide support. Within a short time, he found eager church volunteers and the program was underway.

One of the first programs was teaching computer skills to the women. Each Friday from September to June, two volunteers conduct two one-hour sessions geared toward reacquainting residents with basic computer skills. Robert Bradsell, Nancy Curtis, and I are the primary volunteers for this program. Requelle, a current resident of Crawford House, recently expressed her appreciation of the computer tutors. "I knew very little about computers, and the volunteers from the Blawenburg Reformed Church were very willing to help me to learn these new skills. They never tired of showing me how to use the programs and certainly answered all of my many questions."

Led by Don and Ethel Terhune, the church planted a garden and the residents have planted and harvested vegetables for the past two years. They also helped residents restore a flower garden.

One of the most popular connections has been the soup program. Led by Nancy D'Alessandro, this program teaches residents how to make soup from fresh vegetables. Residents come to the church kitchen several times per year where they receive instruction on kitchen safety and food handling. They receive advice on good nutrition while enjoying the soup they make.

To add some levity to the residents' lives, Jean Butcher travels to Crawford House periodically to teach the residents how to juggle.

When Crawford House found it difficult to deploy staff to pick up food, Director Leyhane reached out to the church, which mobilized several groups of community volunteers to deliver several tons of food from the NJ Food Bank in Hillside.

"We appreciate being part of the community and forming the partnerships like the one established with the congregation from the Blawenburg Reformed Church," stated Director Leyhane. "Members from the church are so very welcoming. In addition, they have created some very interesting projects to interact with the women in our program."

The Crawford House partnership is now in its third year, and the church continues to find ways to help the Crawford House accomplish its mission

"to facilitate physical, emotional, and spiritual healing in a safe and mutually supportive community." Concurrently, the church is also meeting its original goal of community outreach while fulfilling its mission to "commit (its) gifts to worship, hospitality, life-long learning, and serving those in need." This partnership is clearly a win-win for all involved.

Blawenburg Church campus has been rented! Thanks to many hours of negotiations by Mike Vande Woude and a host of helpers, we are able to bring the community to our campus.

Lisa White supervised the repairs and painting, and a new family moved in the latter part of July. Dennis and Lorraine Sparano and their children are now enjoying "our house."

Unfortunately, during this process, we discovered we have a septic problem at the parsonage, but we are working with an engineer and the township to try to correct the problem.

Memorial Hall now has three renters. A Step in Stone continues to rent the warehouse space, and Suzanne Hunt continues to produce her beautiful paintings in her "studio" area upstairs.

The theater space is now occupied by a new renter, Joy Sayen, who runs a dance movement therapy business.
