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Interfaith Prayer Service

Dear friends of Jesus Christ, recently we had the privilege of hosting an interfaith prayer service for our Montgomery community. When I began here at Blawenburg there were many challenges and opportunities presented by the pastoral search team. One of those challenges and opportunities was the felt need for the congregation to find ways to engage with the people of Montgomery, who have been growing more and more diverse in ethnic and religious backgrounds.

This was an exciting challenge that I was interested to help undertake. Personally, I grew up in a very sheltered "Christian" environment. It seemed to me that almost everything my family did was under the shelter, or umbrella, of our Dutch-Protestant community. When I finished college (at the Dutch-Reformed Calvin College), I was questioning the value of Christians staying so separate from those who were of different denominations, religions, and ethnic identities. The question that seemed to really matter in this regard was, "What would God want for us Christians?"

Jesus gave instructions, which have been helping to guide my ongoing quest to answer that and other related questions. Jesus called us to love our neighbors as ourselves. Jesus also answered the question, "Who is my neighbor?" by telling the story of the good Samaritan, a man who was religiously and ethnically "other" and yet did more for a needy man, who would have viewed the Samaritan as "other," than did that needy man's own compatriots.

What is the right way to treat our Muslim, Hindu, and non-religious neighbors? What would God want? The answer that I have come to, at this point in my walk of faith, is to love, welcome, and partner with those, who some might view as "other," or who might view us as "other," with little if no reservation.

As a church, I believe that we have a calling to bless and love our neighbors. We do that by being welcoming. We strive to welcome any neighbor who would be interested to learn more about what we believe about Jesus; to offer prayers to God; and join us in worship and service to God. But even if our neighbors are not at this time interested in putting their faith in Jesus Christ, I believe we still have a calling to bestow upon our neighbors God's love and blessings.

We have been blessed with the resources of a beautiful church campus and I am thrilled that we were able to share that blessing with the interfaith community that gathered here on May 15. I know that the act of sharing our space was deeply appreciated by those who came to the service – I know this because many shook my hand and told me so. I am looking forward to further engagement with our diverse neighbors. Already, in just a few years I have learned and grown, thanks to the engagement with our diverse neighbors, and I trust that God is glad that we are helping to share God's blessings.

SOS Project to Launch this Fall Save our Steeple/Save our Sanctuary

Our old church building will turn 190 in 2020, and it's showing its age. The Properties Team has identified many "issues" that have been let go for too long because of inadequate finances. They realized that if some of the issues are not dealt with, they will be even more costly to remediate in the future.

The list of repairs and improvements is long, and the team has narrowed the list to the most urgent needs. These include:

1. Steeple restoration/damage repair/insulation replacement/exterior lighting replacement/bell support

Reason: Local wildlife (aka bats) have invaded our belfry and taken up residence in our attic. This has caused damage to the insulation and floor of the attic. In addition to the cleanup, we need to seal all the entrances to the belfry/attic, repair damaged wood and paint the steeple, secure the bell and make it easier to ring, and put new lighting on the steeple to remind people that this is God's house.

2. Exterior painting of the church

Reason: It's been more than a decade since the church was painted and it's looking dull and stained. It needs to be power washed, scraped, and repainted.

3. Major organ repair

Reason: Our 1971 Gress-Miles organ was recently evaluated and numerous repairs are needed. It uses 1960s technology and is deficient in the following ways: The contacts and transistor components are very unreliable, which causes numerous dead notes and tone cluster ciphers that can disrupt services. The manual keyboards and key contacts are worn and should be replaced. The stop tablets and contacts also are worn and should be replaced.

4. Repair and repaving driveway and parking areas

Reason: The driveway and parking areas need to be repaved and relined. Last winter's pot holes were filled in with stones as a stop-gap measure, but more substantial treatment is needed.

5. Electrical upgrade of church interior

Reason: Our electrical service in the sanctuary needs to be upgraded to accommodate usage. We need to avoid reduced service and bring it up to code.

6. Painting stairwells and other interior areas of the church

Reason: There are many pews that have paint chips falling from them and need to be stripped and painted. Similarly, the pew doors and other white surfaces in the church need to be cleaned and repainted. The foyer floors were stripped and varnished when the exterior doors were refurbished, but the walls in the stairwells need to be painted.

There are other repairs and maintenance issues, but the team felt that these are the most critical.

How will we pay for all this?

Good question! These repairs are costly and will take time to do. We aren't going to hire a contractor to come in and do everything all at once.

We expect that the cost of these projects will exceed \$200,000. In a small church, it is difficult to raise this amount within the congregation, so we have a three-fold plan to reach our goal:

- We have applied for a grant through the Reformed Church of America. If we are chosen, we would receive \$50,000, which when combined with a \$20,900 insurance payment that we have already received, would pay for the first priority the steeple.
- We have formed a Preservation Fundraising Team, which consists of worshipers and community members. Our church is certainly a treasure to our worshipers, but it is also a community treasure. Being on the National Register of Historic Places, it is a national treasure as well. We will reach out to many people to ask for help in preserving our church. This team has held an initial meeting and will plan the information and fundraising initiatives.
- We will ask our congregation for help, too. We, of course, need money, but we will also be asking for help with new ways to raise funds through events and the personal contacts that each of us has. We will also be asking for congregational help to reduce costs.

We have called our campaign **SOS** – **Save our Steeple/Save our Sanctuary**. We are optimistic that we will reach our goal and help restore some of the luster to our sanctuary and property that will help our community show that we care for God's house as God cares for us.

We are not asking you for anything at this time other than to think and pray about the project. Feel free to share ideas for fundraising with members of the Preservation Team throughout the summer. If you are so inclined, we are seeking a female church member to serve on this team.

Home Safety & Repair Program

A Brush with Kindness



What is the Home Safety & Repair Program?

The Home Safety & Repair Program serves the community by bringing together volunteers to perform critical home repairs or safety modifications so that local individuals and families are able to continue to live independently, safely and comfortably in their homes. This program typically serves low-income homeowners including veterans, people with disabilities, and seniors. Some examples of our projects include:

- Leaky roof repair.
- Weatherization projects.
- Exterior door repairs.
- Critical repair projects.
- Hand rail installation.
- Installation of lever grips.
- Widened doorways and more.

Who Does This Program Serve?

The Home Safety and Repair Program serves:

- An individual or family that is living in an unsafe or unhealthy environment or is in need of a home adaptation to continue to live safely and independently in their home.
- An individual or family that can demonstrate financial need.
- An individual or family that resides in a home in Somerset or Hunterdon County.

Materials for the Project

Donated materials and funds will be used whenever possible to help offset project material costs, which are the responsibility of the homeowner. USDA grants or loans are available in some areas. Once the project has been assessed and agreed upon, Raritan Valley Habitat for Humanity will procure all materials.



Ramps

Ramps create safer and easier access to homes. In addition to serving people with disabilities, they can be crucial for senior home safety so that in the case of emergency the elderly are able to exit the home quickly and safely. Each ramp that Raritan Valley Habitat for Humanity builds is customized to the location where it is installed.

Ongoing Work on Our Buildings and Grounds

Except for mowing & tree work, most all work on our grounds work is done by volunteers. These chores anyone can do at anytime. Sooo... if you are able and have time: the daffodils need deadheading; the weeds need pulling; and sticks need picking up. We have some other jobs also: edging and mulching; filling holes in the driveway and yard; painting the black handrails; and more. For well over two years, our team has discussed the exterior painting of our sanctuary. Over this past winter, we began to gather information for the restoration (painting, bell, bats, etc.) of the steeple, especially. Contractors for the painting and bat cleanup for the steeple have been selected. Hopefully the work will get started next spring, and completed by the end of summer 2020. Our insurance claim for the cleanup was accepted and that payment has been received. However, we need to do serious fund raising to cover these costs, and other work that needs doing.
